D3.1 Main Findings




- Together with Vision and Robotics, LT is one of the three core application areas within AI.
- Current LT allows many advanced applications, unthinkable only a few years ago.
- Even more **exciting results** in the near future.
- LT is outlined as one of the most relevant technologies for society.
- LT is one of the most important AI application areas with a fast growing economic impact.
- However, LT is not equally developed for all European languages.
- Very few dedicated nationally financed programmes addressing LT.

National LT/AI strategies in Europe



All countries surveyed have a national Al strategy

- Croatia?
- No LT-related funding at all
 - Austria, Serbia
- Limited LT-related funding
 - Bulgaria, Czechia, Finland, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Lux., Netherlands, Norway,
 Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden.
- Funding for LT through AI
 - Belgium, France, Germany and Malta
- Dedicated LT programmes
 - Denmark, Estonia, Iceland and Spain

Coordinated LT strategy for the EU?



There is an immense need for **pan-European coordination** and for putting LT into the national Al strategies and into the policies for language, cultural, and technological development

The conclusions of the <u>Education</u>, <u>Youth</u>, <u>Culture and Sport Council</u>, 4-5 April 2022 call for the development of an ambitious digital policy for <u>language technologies</u>, translation and lifelong language learning and teaching. The EU wants to take advantage of new technologies to foster multilingualism, which nurtures cultural exchanges and facilitates access to culture.
